
2. Tia Monson- "Old Monarch" or the Hanging Tree 24 x 48

"Old Monarch" better known as Hanging Tree was on Union Avenue over 120 years ago. It was 336 years old when it was cut down. This 88 ft tall cotton wood was located along South Union Avenue between C and D streets in the middle of the street.

With its location near the banks of the Arkansas River, the tree was thought to have been a popular camping spot for Native Americans and white settlers during the 1800s. Visitors to the rest stop on the range reportedly included famous frontiersmen such as "Buffalo Bill" Cody, Kit Carson and James Butler "Wild Bill" Hickock.


Kathie White's book, "Landmarks and Legacies," describes the tree's removal as being accomplished using a number of saws, axes, pulleys and ropes on June 25, 1883. Pieces of the tree reportedly were distributed as souvenirs. Various accounts put the tree's age at the time of its dismantling at 388 years. Its demise was chronicled in "obituaries" published in local newspapers of that era.
